

The above picture shows sculptures of the California Condor made by Erwin Hauer, EAA 225888. They have been exhibited on over 25 occasions in such places as art galleries, museums and on two occasions at the National Soaring Museum at Elmira, N.Y. These sculptures are made of polyester resin and fiberglass. They have a gross wingspan of ten feet. The Condor shown on the right in the picture was purchased by Dr. Paul MacCready, of man-powered flight fame, and it graces his living room in Pasadena, California.

HOME WEATHER BRIEFING

A "Direct User Access Terminal" (DUAT) is currently being tested by FAA's Technical Center in the field in New Jersey, Delaware, and eastern Pennsylvania area. For this preliminary test, pilots will use terminals set up at the Millville, NJ FSS and at the following airports:

Bader Field, Atlantic City; Capitol City Airport, Harrisburg, PA; Philadelphia International Airport; Flying "W" Ranch, Medford, NJ; Cape May County Airport, Cape May, NJ; Robert Miller Airport, Toms River, NJ; Northeast Philadelphia Airport, and Wilmington-New Castle Airport, DE.

GROB IN SOUTH HANGAR

The Grob motor glider owned by the Nutmeg Soaring Association which usually flies out of the North Caanan CT Airport has been housed in Meriden's South Hangar for the winter. Since it has a heater we may see it flying here throughout the winter.

ELECTRONIC TEST AIDS

Applicants taking FAA written tests will be instructed by monitors to erase any data stored in electronic or mechanical calculators on hand prior to the test, and to surrender any taped printouts. The use of calculator instruction booklets or manuals is also prohibited. NO calculators capable of retaining or retreiving information permanently may be used.

CONCORDE TO LAND AT WITTMAN

The Experimental Aircraft Association annual convention is more than five months away but already there is a prime candidate for headline grabber of 1985.

The EAA announced recently that the British Airways Supersonic Concorde will be making three landings at Wittman Field, allowing European visitors to arrive at the convention in style.

The Concordes will fly at subsonic speeds from New York to Oshkosh, arriving at Wittman Field on July 26, 28 and 30th. The flights are being arranged through Columbus World Wide Travel in cooperation with British Airways and are being offered to EAA members at discount rates.

The Concordes will fly at supersonic speeds from London to New York before departing for Oshkosh. They will return to London on July 28, 30 and August 1. The cost of the flight for EAA members is \$3,130 round trip or \$1,650 one-way. Priority is being given to European EAA members and their families.

NEW SPORTSTER FEATURES VW ENGINE

Poltergeist Aircraft Division of Babee-Saf, Inc., has introduced a new single seat, VW-powered sportplane called the Poltergeist Sportster. designed to be built for less than \$5,000.

The aircraft is of conventional construction throughout, with welded steel tube fuselage and all wood wings. Wing ribs are plywood, and the one-piece laminated wing spar is available in kit form.

The Sportster can accommodate a pilot up to about 6'2" tall. The prototype uses a 1600 cc Volkswagen engine, but the aircraft can use larger VWs, said Bruce Hollander, one of the designers.

With its present prop, the engine turns 3,000 rpm and the plane cruises 130-135 mph. Stall speed is about 54 mph. Hollander said the 17.5-foot wing with 75 square feet of surface area is "a very stable platform," using a 2309-series airfoil and full-span ailerons. The total length of the plane is just over 15 feet.

Hollander is a retired aircraft mechanic. His co-designers on the project were Doc Kauffman and Roger Plate, both of whom are employees of IBM. They said photos were taken throughout the construction of the aircraft, and careful notes and drawings were kept with the novice builder in mind. The plans also contain full-scale templates, professionally-drawn blueprints, and a detailed builder's manual. Cost of the plans package is \$75.

ULTRALIGHT CRACK DOWN

Pilots of ultralight aircraft are about to have their wings clipped. Until now, the single-seat, aluminum-and-fabric sports planes have been free from nearly all federal regulation, and some pilots have flown them wherever they pleased. But the Federal Aviation Administration, concerned that the wayward ultralights might interfere with commercial flight paths and pose airborne hazards, will soon announce new rules requiring all ultralight pilots to be licensed. In addition, each aircraft must be registered and emblazoned with a tail number, so that it can be tracked down if the pilot violates safety regulations.—From Newsweek
