Chapter meeting on August 20 will be at the New England Air Museum. It will cost \$18 but that includes admission to the museum plus a private tour.


North Canaan—now called Triumph Airport—will be having a fly-in on July 15.

Talking with her instructor she is doing a good job preparing for that oral test. We wish her well and thank her for all the work she has put in so far to obtain her pilot license.



Ray Aviation Scholarship awarded:

We have been selected by EAA to participate in the Ray Aviation Scholarship for 2023. There are 182 scholarships for 2023 with 167 chapters of which 23 are new this year. We will now begin the process of selecting our scholar for 2023. Here are the requirements.

- 1. 16 to 19 years old
- 2. Student pilot certificate
- 3. Medical certificate
- 4. Able to begin training within 60 days.
- 5. Commit to 2 hours/month of chapter volunteering.
- 6. Complete training within 12 months.

New this year they have increased the scholarship amount to \$11,000.

342 scholars have received their pilots license through the Rays Aviation Scholarship. 180 scholars are currently in training. The completion percentage is over 80% compared to the national average of 20%. By any means the Ray Aviation Scholarship has been an incredibly successful program.

So, keep your eyes and ears open for potential Ray Scholars. An application can be picked up at the airport or you can direct someone to my email address at tspitler@gmail.com and I will send them an application. All applications should be returned to tspitler@gmail.com by April 30th A committee will then review the application and select our Ray Scholar who we will submit to EAA for approval.



Hatz Classic Build Update

Things have been moving right along in the shop lately. Over the last few winter months, it was nice to see components that have been lingering around the shop finally be assembled and placed on the fuselage.

The control sticks and torque tube (the tube and ailerons will have motion delivered to them) as well as the control linkage going back to the elevator is finally welded in place.

Last month my attention was turned to taking the seat frames I had bent up 5 months or so ago and placing them in position so their attach points could be welded up. Once that was done, the seats were removed, covered in expanded metal, and finish welded. There was a lot of fixture work for this component as the seats needed to be held in 3D space for the dimensions to be derived. I save all my wood scraps as many were repurposed to dimensionally hold the seat in position to get the derived dimensions.






I went off plan a bit regarding the top of the seat back as I felt the expanded metal needed to be capped off and I wanted to apply a bit of a bow in the seat for comfort. It may or may not have been a thinly vailed excuse to buy a shrinker/stretcher from Harbor Freight. It worked perfectly as I had bent a right angle in some thin steel sheet then applied the stretching tool to develop a slight curve in the piece that would give me the desired curve. Happy with that, I welded the expanded metal to the back of it and that finished the seat back off. The rear seat is designed similar but there are posts with saddles that rest on the fuselage. Rarely in welding do you have the ability

to see inside of the tube you're welding. Here are two pictures of the saddle with the ability to see the witness line created when you have full penetration of weld. This confirms my welding settings and process are in tolerance.





In conclusion, it's been a busy winter. I went back to flying a schedule instead of working in the shop waiting for the phone to ring on Reserve, which meant that time needed to be managed. If you're building, keep going. Sometimes if I'm too tired I'll just clean the shop. One less thing......





Tech Tip of the Month

It is great to have a stash of hardware around where you can quickly get what you need and move on with your work. It is not always easy to keep it organized and handy. For years I have been using a fishing tackle box. When my planes were tied down I brought it in my car when I worked on the ramp. Now I keep it in the hangar. It works great. The only modification I made was gluing a foam insert on the inside of the top to keep the upper tray from dumping its contents if the tackle box rolled over in the car. Yes, I learned the hard way! (Mark)



FAA News

FAA Issues New "Task-based" Phase 1 Flight Testing Limitation

Historically, new amateur-built aircraft have been required to remain in a Phase 1 flight test area for a minimum of 25 or 40 hours of flight time, depending on whether or not the aircraft has an "approved" engine/propeller combination. The FAA has issued a new memo (AIR-600-DM04) allowing the use of a "Task-Based" flight test plan, creating the ability for builders to use an individualized task-based approach to meet the flight-testing requirements and resulting in the creation of an aircraft operating handbook (AOH) for their aircraft. This process may (or may not) allow the flight-testing to be completed in less than 25 or 40 hours. FAA AC 90-89C Amateur-built Aircraft and Ultralight Flight Testing Handbook, Chapter 2, provides the criteria for developing and documenting a Task-Based Flight Test Plan. Aircraft previously issued Airworthiness Certificates that have not completed Phase 1 Flight Testing will need the FAA to issue amended operating limitations for their aircraft to utilize the Task-based method (if desired). Future certified aircraft will receive a new operating limitation allowing the use of either method of Phase 1 flight testing. https://www.faa.-gov/documentLibrary/media/Advisory_Circular/AC_90-89C.pdf Richard Rozanski
