50 Flags To Kitty Hawk

EAA's "50 Flags to Kitty Hawk" program, run in conjunction with the National Park Service (NPS), will select one EAA-member pilot from each of the 50 states to fly their respective State Flag to the Wright Brothers National Memorial in Kitty Hawk, N.C., during calendar year 2003. Each pilot will also carry a proclamation from that state's governor declaring the day of their flight "50 Flags to Kitty Hawk Day" for their respective state

Upon arriving in Kitty Hawk, each EAAmember pilot will be welcomed by the National Park Service and take part in official NPS welcoming ceremonies. Following the ceremony, the flag of the pilot's state will be raised and flown throughout the day at the National Memorial. Pictures of the pilots, their state flags and the date of their "50 Flags" flight will be honored on EAA's Countdown to Kitty Hawk website (www.countdowntokittyhawk.org) and updated reports will appear in EAA's Sport Aviation magazine and weekly E-Hotline updates.

EAA member pilots wishing to participate

should use the Pilot Criteria Form available on-line at https://secure.eaa.org/eaajoin/50_flags.html. The form contains all the information and instructions necessary to apply. Pilot selection will be determined by a variety of factors, including the candidate's ability to create enthusiasm regarding aviation and willingness to promote program activities such as raising awareness in local media, EAA Chapter participation and school presentations.

Participating pilots will be responsible for securing their state flag and Governor's proclamation, notifying the NPS of the date of their planned flight and coordinating media coverage of the event in their local state. Details and instructions are provided on the Pilot Criteria Sheet.

EAA's Countdown to Kitty Hawk, presented by Ford Motor Company, was created to commemorate the 100th anniversary of powered flight. Highlighting the initiative is the planned flight of an exact reproduction of the 1903 Wright Flyer on Dec. 17, 2003, at Kitty Hawk, N.C. 
Bulletin Board:

Homebuilder Books

Aeronautical engineer Sonja Englert has written three new books airplane homebuilders. They are *Homebuilt Aerodynamics and Flight Testing; Efficient Powerplant Installation, Piston Engines* and *Composite Facts*.

The first book is for airplane homebuilders and engineers who want to know more about the basic aerodynamics of their airplanes. This book will take you from first flight through performance and flying qualities testing. Only the normal instrumentation and some simple devices are required for the tests. Suggestions are included to solve problems with airplane performance or flying qualities.

Efficient Powerplant Installations, Piston Engines is for everyone involved in engine installations. Most kits or plans-built airplanes do not include very detailed instructions of how to handle the engine installation. This book is intended to fill the gap. Learn about engine mounts, firewall layout, fuel systems, engine cooling optimization for aircooled and liquid cooled engines, cooling drag reduction, cowling design, engine controls, exhaust and induction systems, engine instrumentation, different ignition systems, advantages and disadvantages, propeller selection, oil systems and cabin heat, up to the first engine run.

Composite Facts is not geared towards a specific composite airplane, but includes all the techniques you are likely to encounter when building one. The different fiber materials like class, carbon, aramid and spectra are explained with their different properties, and where they are best used. Manufacturing techniques are explained. Basic stress analysis for composite materials and comparison with metal is given.
