has posted the picture




below with a short blurb about his visit on his Facebook page. He was given a hard copy and email file of the Michael Jackson show flier and the story behind it.

In addition a chance to have a close encounter with the right stuff, this action packed day offers an array of hands-on activities for visitors of all ages. Visitors can try on a space suit, interface with a number of aerospace exhibitors, meet some well known intergalactic droids and characters, view planetarium shows, fly a Space Shuttle simulator at the NEAM Virtual Flight Center, touch a space rock, participate in out of this world experiments and science demonstrations, build and launch straw rockets, and much more!

Special guests for SPACE EXPO 2017 also include UTC Aerospace Systems and One Giant Leap, Inc., the Astronomical Society of Greater Hartford, CATO Rocketry Club, NOAA National Weather Service, Springfield Stars Club, the Springfield Museums and the Talcott Mountain Science Center.

Connecticut's own Spacewalker

Born and raised in Waterbury, Connecticut, astronaut Rick Mastracchio graduated from the University of Connecticut with a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering and Computer Science. He later earned



a Master of Science from Rensselaer Polytechnic Intitule and a Master of Science from the University of Houston-Clear Lake. Mastracchio worked as an engineer at Hamilton Standard (now UTC Aerospace Systems) before joining NASA in 1990. He was selected as an astronaut in 1996, and has logged over two hundred days in space. Mastracchio served on three Space Shuttle Missions and one Russian Soyuz spacecraft mission which included nine spacewalks totaling 53 hours. Mastracchio will present two lectures on his experiences in space at 11:30am and 1:00pm.

Space Expo will run from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., and the museum will close at 5:00 p.m. Admission is \$12.50 for ages 12 and up, \$11.50 for seniors 65 and up and \$7.00 for ages 4 to 11. Skylark (7B6) (Reprint from EAA Ch 166 News Letter)

Skylark Airpark (7B6) is open again. Paving is complete and the runway is operational but pavement markings have not been applied. Please consult your charts for displaced threshold information. Pruning operations have removed several older growth trees from both ends of the runway. The parking lot has also been paved and is now open. Edge backfilling and landscaping along newly paved surfaces and hangar areas is nearing completion. We are told that much is planned for the spring and should commence once the snow melts and the ground dries out. A new self-serve fuel system is in the works but has not yet been delivered. All hangars are full and new (to Skylark) aircraft have begun renting tie downs. Reports on the new surfaces are excellent but the FAA has still not updated surface conditions at the airport so information providers like AirNav and AOPA who rely on FAA information still show the old "asphalt, in fair condition" status for the runway and taxiway. Drainage 11 conduit repairs were ongoing during the late autumn and winter which leave the field in much better shape after a year of significant improvements. The latest rumor is that additional new hangars and repairs to the FBO building are planned to begin this spring.
