Octobers Guest speaker Nivedita Bhasin

Retired Airline Pilot, Air India & International Director, The Ninety-Nines, Inc. Breaking the proverbial glass ceiling at 21 years old, Capt. Nivedita Bhasin is one of India's pioneer Women Pilots. That was in 1984.

Nivedita started her aviation journey as a school girl building Balsa wood chuck gliders, then she became a glider pilot, after which she transitioned to flying planes and ultimately achieved her childhood dream of becoming an Airline Pilot.

In 1989, when just 26, she became the world's youngest Woman Jet Commander. She has flown many large passenger aeroplanes, including the Fokker Friendship F27, Boeing 737, Airbus 300, Airbus 330 and in 2012 she became the world's first Woman Airline Pilot to fly the Dreamliner, Boeing 787.

She also flew the world's first "All women crew flight" in 1985, and holds the FAI world record for the fastest commercial flight in a 787.



Like herself and her husband, both her children are Airline Captains. In fact, theirs is the only family in probably in the whole world to be Airline Captains. After 37 years of active Airline flying, in July 2021 she retired as Air India's Flight Safety Executive Director & Chief of Flight Safety.

Ava's Flight Training with the Civil Air Patrol

Generally speaking, Civil Air Patrol (CAP) is a volunteer civilian auxiliary of the United States Air Force. It encompasses three core missions: aerospace education, youth development, and emergency services. Within CAP there are senior members and cadets, and every Monday a meeting convenes where, at least on the Cadet side of things, we learn about aerospace, do physical conditioning, or practice character development. Personally, my experiences as a cadet in Civil Air Patrol have been wonderful and enriching. I've had the opportunity to participate in a Rocketry course, learn more about the Air-Force, and experience unique aviation activities (e.g, flying an RC airplane, orientation flight). Moreover, when it comes to flight training CAP has enriched my experience considerably. I train in CAP's G1000 - a technologically advanced aircraft, I have been granted the opportunity to tour Bradley International Airport's tower. I am mentored and taught by wonderful CAP instructors -Roger Malagutti and Constance Castillo, and learn from other senior members in CAP in monthly pilot meetings.



When it comes to my flight training as of late the only word, I can think of is repetitive. I don't mean this in any way as a bad thing, repetition is of course how skills are learned and refined. Pattern work is the name of the game for me, constantly I'm practicing in the pattern specifically on my round out and flare. Sometimes I can pull it off and the main wheels touch down smoothly, but more often my attempts are followed with the sound of the airplane plopping onto the runway. I will say however as of Saturday there is less plopping, I think I can say it's finally clicking more than before. At this point, I will continue to be in the pattern until more often than not I can flare the plane correctly.

Tech Tip of the Month

We all have lots of rulers and alike in our shops. But do you have a real tape measure? I have one and use it a lot. Many times I use it to measure around a curve like on a cowl or some other non-flat surface. You can also use it to measure the perimeter of almost any shape. At each airport pilots pick up a card and the goal is to build

the best possible poker hand by lunchtime and the final destination of Westfield-Barnes Regional Airport (BAF).

Early in the day conditions were sub-optimal - several METAR's showed Dew point = OAT and predictably conditions were foggy to 4,500' where the layer of mist gave way to clear skies. Temperatures were forecast to lift throughout the day, topping out at 76°F so we felt comfortable going and that conditions would improve throughout the day.



After collecting a first card each at MMK, a four and seven respectively, they departed to the east, climbing to 3500' for the short hop to Goodspeed (42B). Visibility was 4 miles, clear skies above, and reasonable vertical vis. They detected a hint of wildfire smoke reported on the news the previous evening that contributed to the poor vis. Greeted by Donna Shea and her new puppy they collected their second card at Goodspeed. Also, a four and a seven — looking good. A full house or perhaps two pairs, or a three and a two. Mark and James were

on their way to some good prizes with three more cards to collect at each of three more airports.

They back taxied at Goodspeed and took off toward Windham (IJD) at 1020. Conditions were much the same. 



Kitfox Speedster Project Update


