FIRST FLIGHT, KOLB ON WATER

Just thought I would share what I did this past summer. I haven't been flying my Kolb much lately so after getting my seaplane rating last Fall I decided to convert it to amphibian. I teamed up with Puddlejumper Floats from Montreal and we designed a kit for the Kolb Mk III. After this particular flight there were a few modifications to be made. Move the plane 2 inches forward on the floats to give a better flotation balance and decrease the angle of incidence on the water by a degree. I am finishing up those mods right now and hope to be flying again in a week or so. Tomorrow I will be rigging the final mods and installing the nickel edged prop. If anyone asks, designing and modifying a tail dragger to amphibian sure does define weight and balance. In all its forms: in the air, on the runway and on the water as well as angle of incidence on step.

A&P school starts on Monday so my time will become very limited which will impact next flight.

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Letter from the President

s the saying goes, "time flies when you're having fun". Watching the school kids queue up for the bus, the rather conspicuous foliage changes on a few trees presaging the onset of fall colors, and some delightful sleeping weather with the windows open rather than the air conditioner furiously spinning the electric meter, all point to a summer about to call it quits. Where did the weeks go...didn't summer just begin? My father often remarks, "I feel like I'm having breakfast every five minutes", when taken by surprise with the passage of time. Indeed.

Some random thoughts...

The month of September very often offers some of the best flying weather of the year. Moderating temperatures make for a great time to be out and about by air. It's a good time to start planning a fall foliage trip, perhaps to a small airfield you haven't visited in the past and do a bit of exploring. And with the density altitude beginning to come back down, you'll get a bit of a performance boost to boot.

Speaking of performance, there's a good rule of thumb regarding runway available and takeoff speed. You should have 70% of takeoff speed by 50% of the runway length available, or the half way point. This speed should guarantee takeoff within the remaining half of the runway. If you don't, abort the takeoff.

Meriden Aviators, our new FBO, has been busily at work renovating the outside of the main building at the airport. We don't have a schedule as yet regarding the interior renovation schedule, particularly as to how that will impact our meeting room. As soon as we find out from the management folks, we will let you know and will deal with a temporary meeting site until the renovations are complete.

With the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) forcing the issue regarding the removal of lead from aviation gasoline (AVGAS), the pressure is on industry and the FAA to find a suitable unleaded fuel alternative—not a trivial task considering the safety implications, aircraft performance, and Federal Air Regulations (FAR) compliance risk. The immense effort to see this issue through to an acceptable solution for the general aviation (GA) fleet as a whole will be increasing in intensity as time progresses. The final decision as to what that solution might be will require input from those with the greatest stake in it: aircraft owners and operators. If you have an opinion regarding this issue, it doesn't hurt to contact your governmental representatives and aircraft associations to express your viewpoint. For a good synopsis of the progress to date on finding an unleaded fuel, see the latest issue (Sept. 2010) of AOPA Pilot magazine.

And for a bit of aviation history, who made the first powered flight in an aircraft and when?

The answer is...Jean-Marie Le Bris in 1856. Reportedly, Mr. Le Bris designed a glider, modeled after an albatross, in which he flew to a height of 100 m above his departure point and over a distance of 200 m along a French beach while being towed by a running horse. I guess that qualifies as powered flight.
